- 12 confirmed infectious cases were imported from 6 countries during week 28 of 2014.

Note: The statistics listed in this table include imported cases that were either confirmed or updated\* in the previous week.

- A total of 340 infectious cases were imported from 28 countries in 2014.
- Top 3 imported diseases : Dengue fever (100), Amoebiasis (74), Shigellosis (66).
- Top 3 countries responsible for most imported cases : Indonesia (178), Malaysia (38), Philippines (35).

## Summary of This Week

- **Enterovirus** : The ER consultation rate for enterovirus infection has continued to decline. During week 28, 1 cases of enterovirus infection with severe complications were confirmed. Thus far this year, 5 cases of enterovirus infection with severe complications have been confirmed. Coxsackie A virus is currently the dominant virus strain circulating in the community. With summer vacation coming up, the epidemic is expected to gradually slow down.
- **Dengue fever** : The dengue epidemic in Kaohsiung City has increased rapidly, the public is reminded to clean and remove any indoor and outdoor water containers; and doctors are advised to stay vigilant for any suspected cases and to notify health authorities promptly to prevent further spread of the disease.
- **Japanese encephalitis** : As we reach the peak of the epidemic season, thus far this year, 10 cases of Japanese encephalitis have been confirmed. Taiwan CDC reminds parents are urged to have their children vaccinated as soon as possible. If adults wish to receive the vaccine, they can visit any of the hospitals under the Department of Health or other designated hospitals for self-pay vaccination.
