Suspected Clusters

- In regard to disease clusters, 10 outbreak events were reported, including 6 upper respiratory tract infection clusters, 2 pertussis clusters, 1 varicella cluster and 1 diarrhea cluster.

Imported Infectious Diseases

- 19 confirmed infectious cases were imported from 4 countries during week 22 of 2014.

Note: The statistics listed in this table include imported cases that were either confirmed or updated* in the previous week.

- A total of 262 infectious cases were imported from 25 countries in 2014.
- Top 3 imported diseases : Dengue fever (74), Shigellosis (56), Amoebiasis (52).
- Top 3 countries responsible for most imported cases : Indonesia (141), Malaysia (28), Philippines (25).

Summary of This Week

- **Enterovirus** : As we have reached the peak of the epidemic season, during week 22, no case of enterovirus 71 infection with severe complications was confirmed. The ER consultation rate for enterovirus infection has continued to increase. Coxsackie A virus is currently the dominant virus strain circulating in the community. Thus far this year, 3 cases of enterovirus infection with severe complications have been confirmed (1 CA2, 1CA16 and 1 EV71). Educational institutions are urged to strengthen health education and children are advised to practice proper hand hygiene and rest at home when suspicious symptoms develop. When children develop prodromal symptoms of severe enterovirus infection, they should seek immediate medical care at a large hospital in order to ensure prompt treatment.
- **Dengue fever** : New indigenous cases in Kaohsiung City have continued to occur who had traveled to Cianjhen Distric. Taiwan CDC continues to closely monitor the epidemic situation. Recent showers or thunderstorms often occur, the public is reminded to clean and remove any indoor and outdoor water containers, and doctors are advised to stay vigilant for and notify any suspected cases to the health authority promptly to prevent further spread of the disease.
